
#### **ABOUT THE HOUSE**

# Summer Camps Recap

#### CAMP DAWSON

Eighteen curious campers joined us for the 22<sup>nd</sup> annual history camp June 3-7. With the help of our dedicated youth counselors and adult volunteers, we explored several different eras in our community's history. The list of activities completed by campers was extensive.

Tall Timbers Research Station opened their doors to

us for a special visit which included wagon rides through the Red Hills, a tour of a 1940s tenant house, pea shelling,



corn shucking, and a private watercolor lesson with artist Eluster Richardson. Campers enjoyed the chance to see some wildlife in their natural habitats and to get a taste of life on a tenant farm.

Campers explored the community on Friday with a visit to Paradise Park, the Flowers Heritage Center's "History in the Baking" exhibit, and the Old City Cemetery.

Family and friends were invited to the opening of the campers' exhibit on Friday, June 7. The campers' experiences throughout the week inspired the exhibits they created. Using the story arc template they



learned from storyteller Saundra Kelly, campers' exhibit topics included Tall Timbers, instructions on how to churn butter, life on a 19th-century farm, and more.

#### Camp LPH

Eight enthusiastic campers explored the Lapham-Patterson House from top to bottom during Camp LPH June 18-20. Campers worked their way backwards through time to experience crafts and games from the 1940s through the 1880s.

Campers assembled and painted model airplanes, designed fabrics inspired by Great Depression era flour sack cloths, took a ride in the History Center's 1923 Ford Model T, made marbled paper, designed and painted

"stained" glass, tied lavender sachets, assembled Jacob's ladder toys, and much more. Campers successfully crafted and launched hot air balloons as a finale to their experience.

### Over the last year, thanks to the generous support of the George E. Crouch Foundation, we've been able to make improvements to the landscaping and grounds that have helped to boost the Lapham-Patterson House's curb appeal. In addition to the removal of several trees on the right of way, additional trees were removed from

fountain saw a new water feature installed just in time for the Georgia Trust's Ramble in April.

The large concrete enclosure over the old cistern was replaced with a new, lower profile base and covered with a metal lid for safety. The expansive backyard will allow for more events and outdoor programming. In early summer, attention turned to the former greenhouse. The brick walls were repaired and strengthened and a brick floor re-laid with the goal of making the space functional for rentals and public programs. Canvas umbrellas offered a bit of shade to the concrete picnic tables during summer camp and will be a welcome rest stop for future visitors.

Guests at the History Center's fall fundraising dinner on October 19 will get their first glimpse at the improvements across the property

while they enjoy a specialty cocktail from the newly designed bar in the greenhouse which will be constructed by Blackwater Timber. We hope you'll join us on our exploration of the Lapham-Patterson House's possibilities in October.



MARY MARTHALENE MCRAE DAVIS The Thomasville History Center extends its condolences to the Davis family on the loss of matriarch, Marthalene Davis, Mrs. Davis was a longtime supporter, board member, past President, and advocate for the Thomas County Historical Society.

The Smith Log House was a particular focus for Mrs. Davis, and she could often be found cleaning and staging the historic house.

As President of the Board of Directors in 1985-1986 and 1990, Mrs. Davis was integral in the operations and management of the Society. The exhibition hall added to the Flowers-Roberts House in 1990 bears the Davis's name. The annual matching grant received by the History Center from the Jasper & Marthalene Davis Foundation is a pillar of our operating budget. Both the Davis Wing and the annual grant stand as testaments to their generosity and dedication to the History Center's mission and future.
