Adapting & Reacting

Like everyone, the History Center has a story to tell about out institutional reaction to the pandemic. We carefully watched and anticipated the unknown of the emerging COVID-19 pandemic in early March. Decisions regarding field trips, public programs, and usual operations were day by day until we reached the decision to close.

Throughout the shutdown, we've relied heavily on recommendations from across the community, state, and our colleagues in the museum field. We've all taken part in virtual meetings, discussions, and presentations designed to help us better serve you.

From these online seminars and our own conversations as a staff, we swiftly transitioned from in-person museum work to digital:planning social media campaigns to keep our community engaged if not distracted, tackling a backlog of cataloging and collections work, and juggling the logistics of the staff being physically away from the museum.

From these discussions emerged our plans for the "Distraction Digests," featuring content from our collections and archives, videos, and at-home activities for youth and families. Ephraim was able to tackle huge sorting and organizing projects during the closure that has revealed new and fascinating items in the collection. Like museums across the country, our forced reinvention has yielded exciting new ideas and approaches. We hope that you found, and continue to find, these changes useful as we navigate this ongoing pandemic.

We thank you for continuing to offer your support-

whether through social media, spreading the word of our activities, or joining and renewing your membership. The History Center remains in a strong financial position thanks to your ongoing support!

Make History: Tie Dye, Part II



Garage Receives an Update

Just after the History Center closed its doors to the public in March, the 1936 Ford Phaeton returned home to the Flowers-Roberts Garage. Donated in 2018 by a community member who wishes to remain anonymous, the operational yellow Phateon is a striking addition to the History Center's "stable" of antique automobiles.



Also taking place during the closure, were ongoing repairs to the garage doors and mechanisms. Blackwater Timber generously donated their time, materials, and labor to rebuild sections of several of the original garage doors that date back to its construction in the late 1940s by the Roberts family. Join us in sending a special thanks to Rick Bradner for repainting the repaired panels for us.

Rose City Garage repaired and replaced some of the original hardware, tracks, and springs. Weather stripping on the bottoms of each door will help to keep the interior clean. For the first time in many, many years, all six garage doors can now be opened! This allows for 360 degree views of the vehicles and easier parking after they've been taken out for a ride. The circular driveway continues behind the garage so that cars can easily pull in and out without having to reverse into or out of the garage.

Next on the project list for the Garage is to resurface the concrete floor to better feature the automobiles. In addition to the structural updates, we've installed new exhibit panels that tell the stories of each automobile as well as the fire equipment and WPAX transmitter on display in the garage. These panels join several other new signs that have been added to the interiors of the historic buildings to help guests during their selfguided tours.
