Beth Grant, Friends of Lost Creek Forest Virtual Lecture: March 16 @7:30pm

Beth Grant is a retired mental health counselor and educator. She has had a very active retirement as the leader of the 2008 Save Our Forest movement and Friends of Lost Creek Forest. For over 10 years, she was also lead volunteer at Wolf Creek Trout Lily Preserve in Grady County. Very involved at Birdsong Nature Center and in the Tallahassee Magnolia Chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society, Georgia Botanical Society, and Georgia Native Plant Society, she has enjoyed or led countless field trips to natural areas in Georgia and Florida. She has presented on the book *Bringing Nature Home* more than 50 times at Birdsong Nature Center, libraries, garden clubs, conferences, and other interested organizations, as well as programs on gardening



with native plants and the Trout Lily Preserve. She is the lead volunteer at Cherokee Pollinator Garden, Thomasville's public butterfly garden that features native plants.

(Optional) Add seltzer to make it bubbly!




Rick Van Noy, Radford University Virtual Lecture: March 30 @7:30pm


Rick Van Noy is the author of several books, including Sudden Spring: Stories of Adaptation in a Climate Changed South (2019), one of Book Riot's best environmental books for readers who want to save the planet. Sudden Spring is a "call to action" to slow the current trends in environmental impact by highlighting the human side of climate change in the South. Van Noy will explore the efforts southern communities are making to become more "climate resilient" and how they're facing environmental challenges.

Van Noy is also the author of *A Natural Sense of Wonder: Connecting Kids with Nature Through the Seasons* (2008), winner of the Southern Environmental Law Center's 2009 Reed award for "outstanding writing on the Southern environment"; and *Surveying the Interior: Literary Cartographers and the Sense of Place* (2003). His work has been anthologized in several publications. Rick teaches courses in the environmental humanities, creative nonfiction, professional writing, and American literature at Radford University.

### Equinox at the Lapham-Patterson House

Each year on the vernal equinox, observers on the Lapham-Patterson House's third floor can see an unusual play of light and shadow. Last year, we had to cancel our annual celebration of this effect, but we're back this year with special tour hours to maximize your viewing of the effect and keep you safe. The damaged woodwork on the bargeboard has also been replaced so the "effect" should be in full glory (weather depending).



#### Equinox Tours: March 19, 4pm & 5pm; March 20, 4pm & 5pm

Each tour will include a guided tour of the first floor of the House and ample time to independently explore the 2nd and 3rd floors, including time to view the light and shadows. Masks are required and regular admission rates apply. There will be a brief time when both tour groups overlap, but we will do our best to ensure the maximum flow of air on the 3rd floor.

We will have a maximum capacity of 10 people per hour. Reservations are required. Remember, members receive free admission to the Lapham-Patterson House. #### **Student Photo Essay Competition Winners Announced**

In response to COVID-19, five local organizations came together to collect and document the pandemic within Thomas County. The collective work of the Jack Hadley Black History Museum, Pebble Hill Plantation, Thomasville Center for the Arts, Thomas County Public Library, and Thomasville History Center has been ongoing since June and now continues with the results of the new academic competition for students. The Thomas County Chronicles COVID project was designed to collect community materials that tell our stories during the pandemic. The photo-essay competition captured student perspectives on the pandemic and the

ways it has changed their day-to-day lives.


We are grateful for the participation we received from students at Thomas County Middle School, Thomas County Central High School, and the Scholars Academy. More than 120 projects across several categories were submitted. The Thomas County Chronicles COVID partners judged projects on their photographic impact and creativity, the students' composed words, and relation to the theme.

The students created first-hand records of their community that document the stories of the ongoing pandemic and how our community has adapted. ## Volunteer Spotlight

Loving history and our community, retired public library director, Nancy Tillinghast found an outlet to pursue this love: The History Center. When she first began volunteering she stuffed envelopes with news of the History Center, transcribed family letters from 1877 (handwriting certainly has changed) and now she is entering donated newspapers to the collection. Nancy is enjoying reading the newspapers as she enters them. Nancy enjoys the work and working with the staff.

# Collections Spotlight

This chair is one of eight donated to the History Center by the estate of William F. MacInyre. The chairs were built by prisoners at the Kentucky State Penitentiary in Frankfort which was established in 1798. It was the first prison west of the Allegheny Mountains. Prisoners constructed the chairs as part of their work program which allowed inmates to practice trade skills, like blacksmithing, coopering, and furniture making.

Constructed in the "continuous armchair" style, prisoners built these chairs from about 1810 through the 1850s.

The seat is made of woven flat reed or splint. Others constructed at the Kentucky State Penitentiary featured wooden seats. The chairs in our collection were used by descendants of Archibald Thompson McIntyre at Boxhall Plantation. The exact dates of their journey and arrival from Kentucky to Thomasville are unknown.

Ron Hurst, Vice President of Museums, Preservation, and Historic Resources and the The Carlisle H. Humelsine Chief Curator of the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation, visited the History Center in December to look at the MacIntyre set. After his confirmation of the chair's origins, the History Center proudly donated a chair to the collection of the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation. There, it will add to their growing collection of Kentucky decorative arts and the ongoing study of colonial-era furniture makers.

Garden Plans Underway

With the help of new Board member Mercer Watt, we are developing a garden plan to help us better implement and sustain our learning gardens at the Smith Homestead and the Joyner-Calloway House. The first step in the process was to collect soil samples. These samples were analyzed by the local University of Georgia Extension Office. From the reports provided by the Ag & Environmental Services Labs in Athens, we're better prepared to prepare the gardens for planting in early spring.

The Smith Homestead will feature four rotating crop sections of vegetables, herbs, and flowers, and a section for cotton. Each year the History Center applies for and receives a permit from the Georgia Boll Weevil Foundation to plant a small square footage of cotton plants for educational purposes. In return, the Boll Weevil Foundation has provided us with an informational sign that describes the threat the boll weevil poses to local farms. The Foundation monitors our cotton patch and others across the region for the entirety of the growing season.

The raised beds at the Joyner-Calloway House will continue to feature plants that can be used for natural dyes, herbs, and vegetables. We researched the necessary steps to build a compost bin so we can keep the soil in top form and will begin construction with the help of volunteer Chris Linton soon! #### **Getting Oriented**

The final details of the Orientation Room time line have been sent off for production and will be installed soon. The time line, encompassing thousands of years of history in the Red Hills region, will wrap the entirety of the Orientation Room and offer a special backdrop for visitors as they watch the new orientation video. Summerhill Creative has been hard at work compiling the new video which will feature archival images from our collection that track the development and evolution of the community. We are excited to announce that June White has agreed to narrate the

#### Fire Department Exhibit, Hallway

The changes to the hallway connecting the Flowers-Roberts House to the Davis Wing are striking. A new paint job highlights a display that will draw guests through the space. The hallway will feature artifacts from the Thomasville Fire Department and the complete Gamewell Fire Alarm System that began alerting local firefighters in 1924. The set includes an original fire box that was located in town and was connected to the transmitter, switchboard, and indicator gong, or "Old Mary" as it was called, by telegraph line.

#### **Davis Wing**

The Davis Wing received the most extensive updates. The writing stage of the process is by far the most time consuming and requires a great deal of discussion and mounts. Protective acrylic boxes were installed offering protection to artifacts on display while still allowing guests to see them from multiple angles. The

"Boston Has Two Banks" banner went up recently and will be one of the featured artifacts in our new County Towns exhibit.
