


2025 At A Glance





FROM THE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends,

Bookended by snowfall and a state championship, Thomasville's 2025 was a truly historic year. It reminded us how shared moments become the stories we pass down. At the Thomasville History Center, 2025 was likewise a significant year, marked by transition, reflection, and thoughtful preparation for the future.

Throughout the year, the History Center remained an active and welcoming place for learning and connection. In 2025, we welcomed thousands of visitors to our campus, hosted a full calendar of public events and programs, and served nearly 2,000 students and educators through school tours, field trips, and hands-on learning experiences. From family-focused programming to adult lectures and special events, history continued to be experienced not just in exhibits, but through shared moments and meaningful engagement.

The History Center played a visible role in community-wide milestones in 2025. We contributed to planning efforts for the City of Thomasville's upcoming Bicentennial in 2026, helping shape how this historic anniversary will be recognized across the community. We also proudly co-hosted the Thomas County 2025 Bicentennial celebration during Victorian Christmas, bringing residents and visitors together to honor two centuries of shared history and tradition.

I joined the History Center team in mid-August 2025, and the latter part of the year provided an opportunity to listen, learn, and assess. With a campus made up of historic buildings, it became clear that one of our most immediate responsibilities is stewardship. Ensuring these structures are safe, well maintained, and welcoming is essential to everything we hope to accomplish moving forward.

For that reason, 2026 is intentionally framed as a year of fortification. Our priorities include addressing ongoing maintenance needs, enhancing safety and accessibility, and strengthening internal systems and resources. This work builds on prior stewardship and ensures that our historic campus is prepared to support thoughtful exhibit enhancements, expanded programming, and broader campus improvements in 2027 and beyond.


At the same time, we remain committed to reducing barriers to access and welcoming new audiences, especially children and families. Introducing young people to history at an early age fosters curiosity, connection, and lifelong learning. We've already taken steps to lower admission prices and begin reexamining the visitor experience to ensure the History Center is approachable, inclusive, and engaging for visitors of all ages.

I am grateful to the dedicated staff, Board of Directors, volunteers, and supporters who embraced this period of transition with care and confidence. HIGHLIGHTS

COLLECTIONS

- Accepted 32 new collections donations
- Completed the Elizabeth Hopkins Collection project, including professional arrangement, description, and publication of searchable online finding aids
- Responded to and fulfilled 943 research requests
- Launched a major reorganization and redesign of collections storage, freeing up valuable floor space and ensuring staff can work more safely and efficiently

PROGRAMS

- Hosted Crate to Plate, an outdoor community dinner celebrating local foodways, music, and gathering under the pines
- Presented the 33rd Annual Pilau Dinner, the History Center's largest single-day public event and a cornerstone of community engagement
- Continued offering seasonal programs, tours, and family-friendly events that welcomed both longtime supporters and first-time visitors
- Partnered with the Thomas County Board of Commissioners to present "An Act: A Commemorative Reading of An Act to Create Two New Counties" during Victorian Christmas; the program featured historic artifacts, multimedia interpretation, costumed interpreters, and a public reading of Thomas County's founding document

SUPPORT

- Sustained strong community support through memberships, sponsorships, event participation, and annual giving
- Raised \$4,175 during the annual GivingTuesday campaign, reflecting broad grassroots support for the History Center's mission



EDUCATION

- Hosted two weeks of Summer Camps, serving 40 campers ages 5-11 and middle school students through hands-on, place-based learning
- Delivered 12 on-site field trips serving 870 students and 14 outreach programs serving 1,000 students, for a total of 1,870 students served
- Apprentices participated in regional museum visits, professional mentorship, and original research projects, culminating in a public Capstone Showcase in April

VISIBILITY

- Expanded the History Center's digital presence through consistent storytelling across social media, blogs, radio and TV interviews, and email communications
- Published 24 blog posts highlighting collections, programs, events, and local history
- Achieved significant growth in social media reach and engagement by emphasizing community-centered narratives, visual storytelling, and timely content

LEADERSHIP

- Meme Greitzer was recognized as Emerging Museum Professional of the Year by the Georgia Association of Museums in February and was promoted to Curator of Engagement, reflecting her leadership and expanding role
- Ephraim Rotter marked more than 18 years at the Thomasville History Center in July, providing deep institutional knowledge and long-term leadership in collections and research
- Lisa Clements joined the staff as Interim Director in April and transitioned into the role of Director of Operations, bringing extensive experience as a school administrator with over 30 years in Thomas County School System
- Austin Bell joined the History Center in August as Executive Director, bringing nearly 20 years of museum experience, most recently as Chief Curator at the Museum of Florida History




FINANCIALS

In 2025, the Thomasville History Center balanced strong community support with careful stewardship, investing primarily in people, programs, and the preservation of historic resources. The year ended with a positive net operating result and continued growth in total assets, strengthening the organization’s long-term financial position.


2025 REVENUE

Community support in 2025 came from a balanced mix of philanthropic giving (71%), memberships (7%), earned revenue (8%), events (9%), and long-term investment support (5%).




2025 EXPENSES

In 2025, the majority of the History Center’s resources supported people (51%), education (14%), and the care of historic buildings (17%), ensuring meaningful public impact and responsible stewardship. 8% of expenses went to fundraising and events while 11% covered operations.




ASSETS COMPARISON (2024 – 2025)






